One of the limbs that penetrated the roof wedged itself into a bedroom door, requiring firemen from the Winchendon Fire Department to pry

open the door so that the individual could exit the room. Fortunately, no one was injured. However, due to the damage sustained to the roof and the electrical system, the building inspector felt that it was unsafe to occupy the house and everyone was evacuated to the Colonial Inn in Fitchburg, MA where they stayed through the Thanksgiving and Christmas holiday.

They were able to move back into the restored home after the new year started.

They have done the MOST AMAZING job from start to finish during this crisis.

In the 3 months of displacement (90 days): I had only 2 call outs - staff were the most dependable in this time of need.

I had zero MOR or serious IR.

The individuals continued to get out in the community and have family visits.

Staff decorated the hotel rooms during the holidays to make it special for them.

They baked home made meals and baked goods.

They sang, danced and read to them in their two small hotels rooms.

They loved, cared for, and

comforted a special lady when her mother passed unexpectedly. Two staff joined her on their own time for her mother's "Celebration of Life".

From the 2 a.m. phone call to report the fallen tree, evacuation, settling the rooms, cleaning and putting everyone's room back together, making their house a home again, etc. - these staff are the poster children for ABOVE and BEYOND!

In the human service world, where we sometimes lose the MOST important word... HUMAN, I can say that the staff I have are true heroes.

I wanted to take the time to also note the Day Habs that helped with meals at their programs to elevate some of the pressure.

Thank you to the maintenance department for all their help.

Through this whole process the ladies were happy, healthy, and cared for like

family, and for that I'm proud to send this on behalf of my staff!

We have a small amount of organizing and filing left to be 100% set, but I am confident it will be done without hesitation.



This past spring and summer were jam packed with adaptive activities out in the community! Clients from our southern programs were able to participate in: adaptive swimming, kayaking, and hiking. We even had the opportunity to visit a horse farm which we will be partnering with in Spring 2020 to bring back adaptive horseback riding.

This year was the first year adaptive swimming was available through Easter Seals and the Universal Access Program. This program ran for 6 weeks during the summer on Friday's, and was located at Bennett Pool in Worcester, MA. The program focused on learning basic swimming skills/strokes,

water safety, as well as fosterina a safe environment to have fun

and make new friends. Our clients definitely loved it and we look forward to continued involvement next year. The cost for participation in this program is \$5 per session per client.

Adaptive kayaking really blossomed this year! Thanks

to the help and extra funding from Blackstone Valley Corridor, DCR added two more kayaking sessions this summer. This allowed our therapy staff to take a larger number of participants and give more of our individuals an opportunity to try this fun activity. The program ran for 8 weeks on Thursday's and was mainly located at Lake Qunisigamond

in Worcester, MA. One session was offered at Wallum Lake in Douglas, MA, which was a nice change of environment and closer to home for our guys. Kayaking is always such a fun whole day experience filled with lots of joy

The benefits of these adaptive programs are so substantial and priceless. I love being able to foster individual growth by providing new experiences for our individuals who might not have been able to try these activities otherwise. By being immersed and participating in these community experiences, our individuals learn valuable life skills that can't be taught.
